

### **Sample Description**

- Final sample size of 1,990
- 2,301 surveys returned, but 311 not included because partially completed (10% or less)
- 96% current resident of San Diego County
- 98% surveys completed in English
- Primary language spoken at home: 88% English, 4% Spanish, 8%
   Spanish and English, 1% other
- Gender: 48% male, 51% female, 2% non-binary
- 25% identify as Hispanic/Latino/Latina
- 72% White/Caucasian, 11% other, 8% Black/African-American, 7% Asian/Pacific Islander, 2% American Indian




### **Sample Description**

- 12% current or former military
- 13% have a disability
- Median age: 46 (range 17-104)
- Highest education: 6% no degree, 6% 12<sup>th</sup> grade, 3% GED, 3% vocational, 13% some college, 8% AA, 27% BA, 36% Master's or higher
- Where live: 26% Central, 22% North City, 16% East, 13% South, 13% North County East, 10% North County West




### **Community Public Safety Concerns**




Very Concerned


### Perception of Where Public Safety Changes Should be Made



■Top1 ■Top2 ■Top3




### Self-Reported Needs of Current/Formerly Incarcerated





### **Percent With Need That Received That Service**





### **Helpfulness of Services Received**






### **Barriers to Service**


65% of those who sought services in the community said there were barriers that made it hard to get them


### **Effect of Incarceration on Employment**







### **Effect of Incarceration on Mental Health**




### **Effect of Incarceration on Family**






### **Perception of What Made Reentry Successful**

### **Other Survey Data**

- 42% said they or an immediate family member was the victim of a crime in the past 3 years
  - 27% they were (27% violent, 76% property, 7% other)
  - 30% family member (33% violent, 74% property, 5% other)
- 63% thought crime in their neighborhood had increased in the past 3 years, 5% it had decreased, and 32% it had stayed the same
- 79% thought crime in San Diego County had increased in the past 3 years, 4% it had decreased, and 17% it had stayed the same



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### **Discussion of Community Forum Participation** 5:20-5:30

### **Community Forum Overview**

- Service provision structure: Structure and funding of County programs were criticized as being siloed, having inconsistent treatment duration, and that funding structure led to underpaid service provider staff with high levels of turnover. Need to expand continuum of services in context of sobering centers - no mechanism for follow up contact after they leave. Gaps in homelessness services and mental health services ("a buildings deficit").
- Service availability in the jail system: Need for more services in jail including
  professional behavioral health assessment and more behavioral health services and
  peer support services.
- Data availability and sharing: Need better data availability and follow up surveying on individuals formerly incarcerated. Need for more data sharing between law enforcement and behavioral health.



### **Community Forum Overview**

- Legal transition away from involuntary treatment poses challenges Not everyone takes voluntary treatment options contingency based treatment (incentives for compliance) is one option. Related to this, there were divergent opinions on the Care Courts proposal.
- **Specific issues that need more follow :** People having interruptions in Social Security and SSI benefits related to incarceration and HUD 90-day rule limiting housing opportunity.
