# **Arrests 2019 and 2020: Law Enforcement Response to Crime in the San Diego Region**

NOVEMBER 2021

Research findings from the Criminal Justice Clearinghouse

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## Introduction

The Applied Research Division of the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) functions as the Clearinghouse for criminal justice information in the San Diego region. On an annual basis, the Division prepares a report on local criminal justice agencies' response to crime in the region as measured by arrest statistics. Because arrest statistics include information regarding whether the suspect is an adult or juvenile and a greater variety of crime types than are reported in regional crime reports (e.g., alcohol/drug-related offenses), this information provides an added dimension for understanding the nature of crime and another measure that can be used in justice system planning.

This CJ Bulletin includes regional arrest rates per 1,000 residents for both adult and juvenile populations, as well as number of arrests by offense type. Because a report was unable to be produced in 2020 as described below, new data for calendar year 2019 and 2020 are shared here. Some points to remember when interpreting these numbers include the following:

- Similar to how the FBI reports crimes, the offense or charge attributed to an arrest reflects only the most serious out of multiple potential violations included in the arrest.
- Arrests are documented by the location at which the arrest occurred and cannot be assumed to have any relationship to the location of the crime incident or the residence of the alleged offender.
- Arrest and crime rates and numbers should not be compared to one another. One reason is that the two events may occur in two entirely different periods of time, with an arrest made months or even years after the related crime was reported.

## Highlights

- Arrest rates for both adults and juveniles were at seven-year lows in 2020.
- In 2020, the felony arrest rate was 14% lower than it was in 2019 and the misdemeanor arrest rate was 38% lower.
- There was an average of 163 adult arrests per day in the San Diego region in 2020, down from 237 in 2019.
- Around 1 in every 3 arrests were at the felony level in 2020, compared to around 1 in every 4 in 2016.
- For adults, arrests for a violent offense decreased the least (-9%) from 2019 to 2020 and the category with the largest decrease was "other" offenses (-41%).
- For juveniles, arrests for weapon offenses had the largest one-year decrease (-45%) and those for a property crime the least (-14%). Arrests for a status offense (curfew violation) were up 6%.
- While fewer juveniles were arrested for a property crime in 2020, compared to 2019, within this category a greater number were arrested for motor vehicle theft and burglary.
- Black individuals were overrepresented in all arrest categories in 2020, compared to their proportion of the population and Hispanic individuals were overrepresented in some. White individuals and those who represented "other" races/ethnicities were generally underrepresented.

- For youth, even though contact with law enforcement is made and an arrest report is taken, diversion to a community-based organization or other type of program or release to a parent or guardian may occur as an alternative to juvenile justice system processing.
- The data presented here were provided by Automated Regional Justice Information System (ARJIS), a different source than the California Department of Justice (DOJ), which provided data for previous reports. Because multiple requests for these data to DOJ were not responded to, SANDAG had to change the source of these data. As a result, data were only available for 2014 through 2020 and ten-year comparisons were not possible. Additional information related to this change is included at the conclusion of this report.

## ***How is COVID-19 possibly related to the arrest statistics presented here for 2020?***

2020 represented an unprecedented year, as can be seen by the arrest statistics presented here. While it is impossible to say exactly how the pandemic directly or indirectly affected public safety, it is clear that a number of direct and indirect factors should be taken into consideration.

- With the stay home order, some individuals began working remotely, businesses were closed, and community events that would have brought people together were cancelled. As such, there were fewer opportunities in some ways for crime to occur (e.g., fewer residential burglaries), and more ways in others (e.g., non-residential burglaries).
- A number of policies and procedures were put into place to promote social distancing and reduce the risk of viral transmission. Across the State of California, court hearings began to be held remotely and due to the impacted court system and delay in court proceedings, the unsentenced population in county jails increased. A “zero bail” policy was also enacted which resulted in fewer individuals being detained in local jail pre-adjudication. Other efforts across the state included early releases for eligible inmates.
- At the same time, community-based organizations providing services to justice-involved individuals had to pivot and may have had challenges engaging individuals to address underlying issues related to their justice involvement remotely.
- Mandated reporters may not have had the same opportunity to identify victims that they would have been able to assist previously. Depending on the jurisdiction, local law enforcement could have also modified the level and type of proactive contact they had with individuals.
- Also, not related to the pandemic, 2020 represented a significant year for discussions related to public safety reform, another factor which could have impacted how law enforcement and the community interact.

## Arrest rates<sup>1</sup>

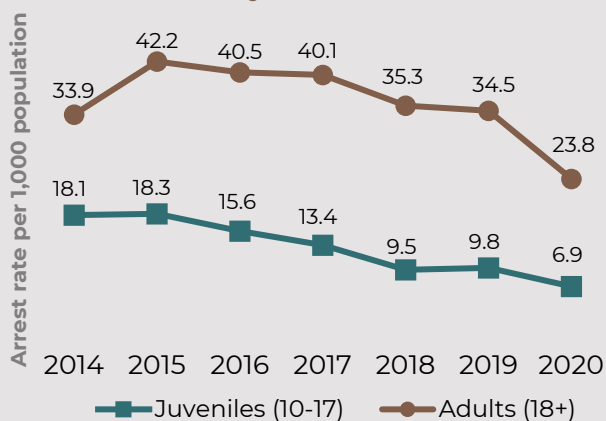
### Trends

In 2019, there were 34.5 adults arrested per 1,000 population, which decreased to 23.8 in 2020 (a decrease of 31%). As Figure 1 shows, this 2020 rate was the lowest in the past seven years. Across the jurisdictions, the 2019 adult arrest rate varied from 11.9 (Carlsbad) to 60.5 (Lemon Grove) and in 2020 this range decreased to 8.5 (in Carlsbad) to 37.8 (in El Cajon). All 19 jurisdictions had lower adult arrest rates in 2020, compared to 2019, with decreases ranging from -10% in Coronado to -55% in Del Mar (Appendix Table 5).

For juveniles, while the 2019 arrest rate of 9.8 was slightly higher than it was in 2018 (9.5), the 2020 rate of 6.9 represented a seven-year low and a decrease of 30% from 2019. Across the jurisdictions, the juvenile arrest rate varied from .9 (Solana Beach) to 18.6 (Escondido) in 2019 and from .9 (Solana Beach) to 13.4 (Imperial Beach) in 2020. All 12 jurisdictions with large enough juvenile arrest numbers for comparison in 2019 and 2020 had decreases, ranging from -6% in Imperial Beach to -67% in Escondido (Appendix Table 8).

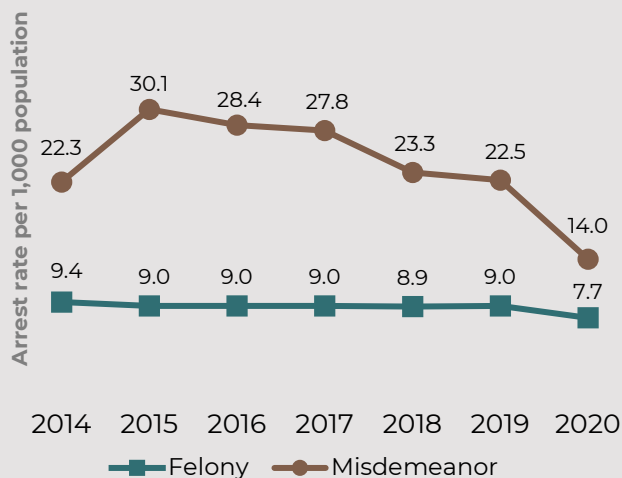
<sup>1</sup> Across individuals age 10 and older, those between the ages of 20 and 29 had the highest arrest rate in 2020 (39.7), followed by those 30 to 39 (34.6) (Table 2b).

## Felonies and misdemeanors

In 2015, the year following the passage of Prop 47, which reduced a number of property- and drug-related offenses from felonies to misdemeanors, the felony arrest rate declined by 4% (from 9.4 in 2014 to 9.0 in 2015) and the misdemeanor arrest rate increased by 35% (22.3 in 2014 to 30.1 in 2015), directional differences that may have been expected with this legislative change (Figure 2). Since 2015, the felony rate remained fairly stable, but fell from 9.0 in 2019 to 7.7 in 2020, a decrease of 14%. For misdemeanors, the rate decreased in 2016 and continued to drop every year since then, to 22.5 in 2019 and 14.0 in 2020 (a 38% decrease from 2019) (Appendix Tables 3 and 4).

#### Felony and misdemeanor arrest rates at 7-year lows in 2020



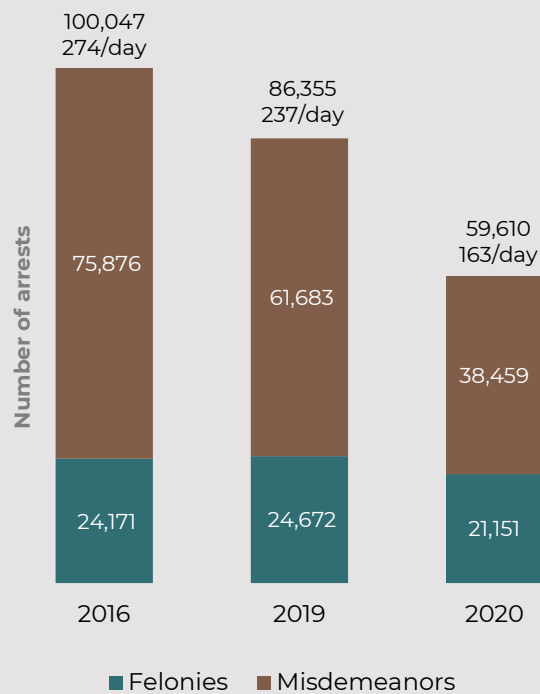

## Number of adult and juvenile arrests

As Figure 3a and Appendix Table 12 show, there were fewer adult arrests in 2020 (59,610), compared to 2019 (86,355) and 2016 (100,047). Over the same period, the percent of arrests at the felony-level increased from 24% in 2016 to 29% in 2019 and 35% in 2020.

### Fewer adult arrests per day in 2020 compared to 2016 and 2019

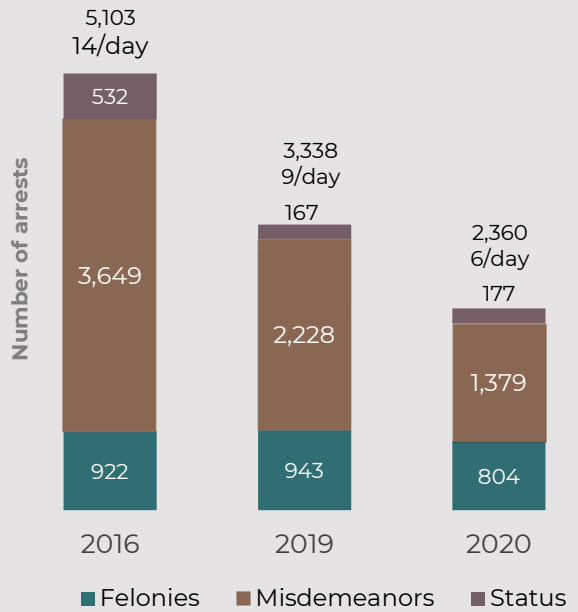

For juveniles, there has been a similar pattern, with fewer arrests overall each year (Figure 3b and Appendix Table 25) and a greater percentage at the felony level (18% in 2016, 28% in 2019, and 34% in 2020).

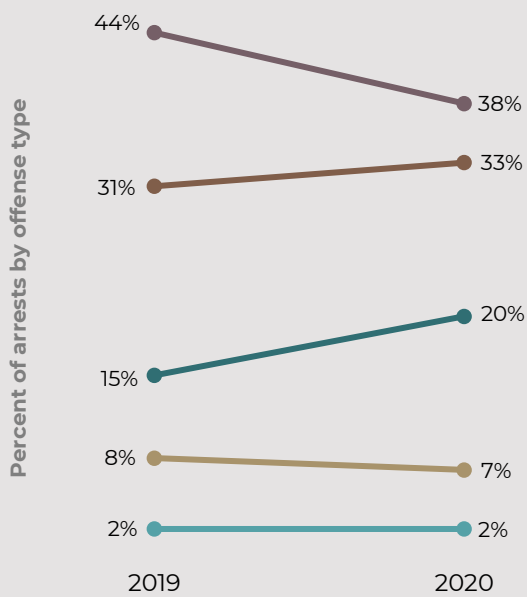
## Arrests by offense type

What types of crimes were adults and juveniles arrested for in 2019 and 2020?

As Figure 4a shows, in both years the most common arrest type was for “other” offenses, but it represented a smaller percentage in 2020 (38%) compared to 2019 (44%). Over the same period, the proportion that represented arrests for a violent offense increased (from 15% to 20%). The proportion of arrests for an alcohol/drug-related offense, the second most common arrest type, also increased slightly from 2019 to 2020 (31% to 33%).

### Greater proportion of adult arrests were for a violent offense in 2020, compared to 2019



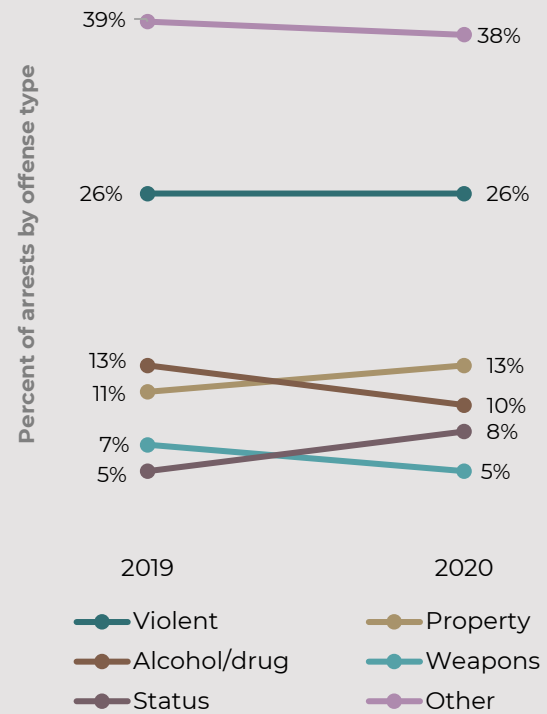
● Violent      ● Property

For juveniles (Figure 4b), the most common arrest reason in 2020 was also for an “other” offense (38%), followed by violent (26%), property (13%), alcohol/drug (10%), status<sup>2</sup> (8%), and weapon (5%). Compared to adults, there was less change in the proportions by type from 2019 to 2020.

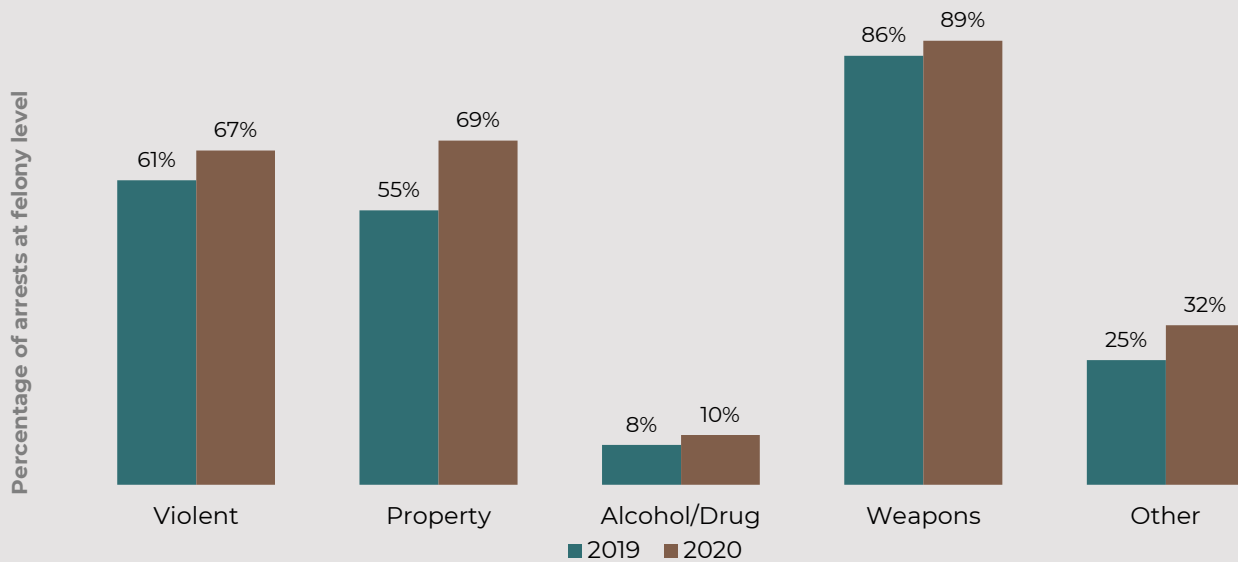

<sup>2</sup> A status offense is one in which only a juvenile can be arrested for. As shown in Appendix Table 38, the only status offense type documented in 2020 was for a curfew violation.

As previously noted, about one in three arrests were at the felony-level in 2020. However, the proportion of arrests that were felonies versus misdemeanors varied considerably by crime type for both adults (Figure 5a) and juveniles (Figure 5b). Specifically, arrests for weapon offenses were most likely to be a felony, while those for “other” and alcohol/drug offenses were least likely to be a felony.

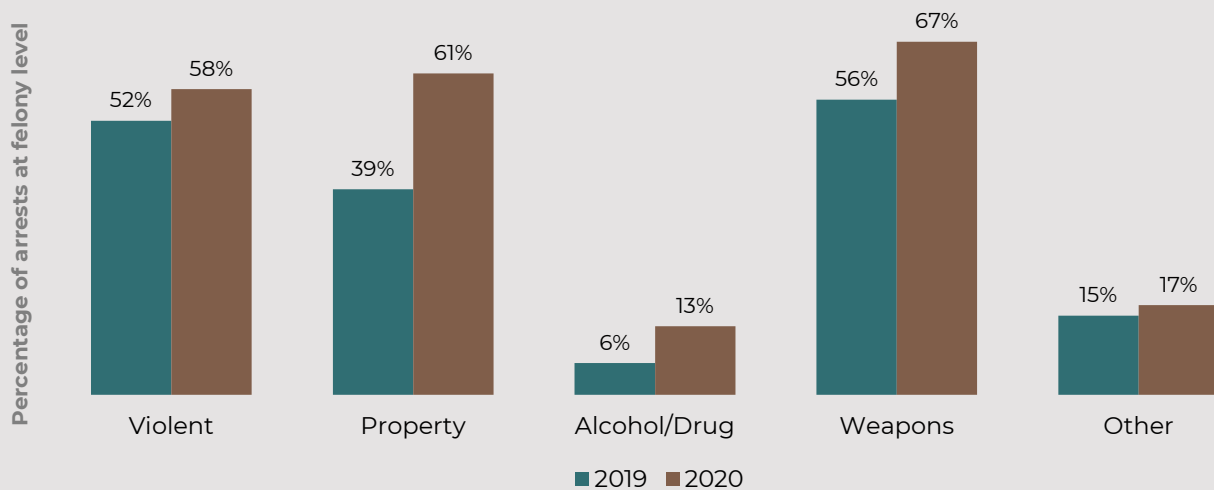
**Greater proportion of adult arrests were a felony in 2020**

**Greater proportion of juvenile arrests were a felony in 2020**



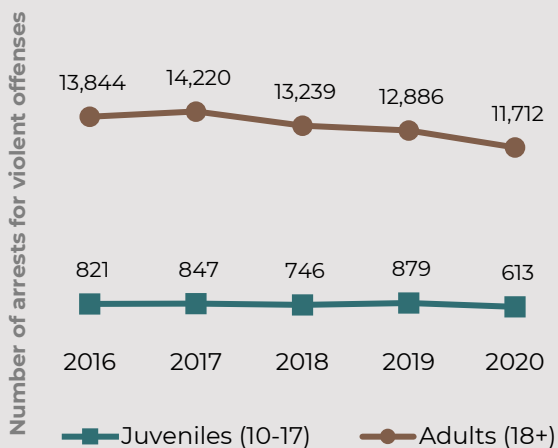

## Violent offenses

The violent offense arrest category includes four felony-level (homicide, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) and one misdemeanor-level (manslaughter/assault and battery) offense. There were 11,712 adult and 613 juvenile arrests for violent offenses in 2020 (Figure 6). Arrests for a violent offense decreased 9% over the past year for adults (Appendix Table 19). For juveniles, there was a 30% decrease from 2019 to 2020 (Appendix Table 32).

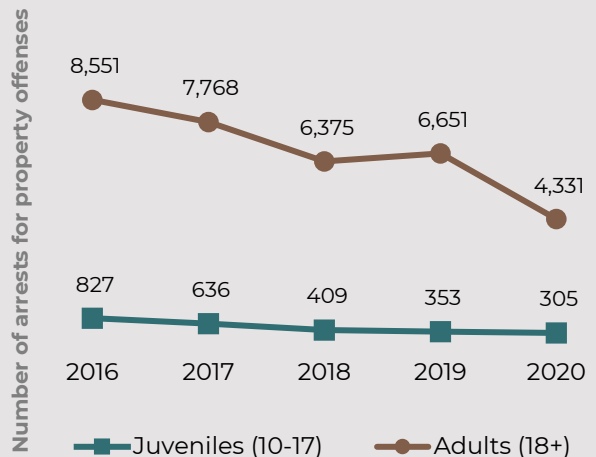
For adults, there were one-year decreases in the number of arrests for rape (-22%), misdemeanor manslaughter/assault and battery (-22%), and robbery (-16%), but an increase for homicide (42%) (Appendix Table 20). For juveniles, there were decreases in the number of arrests for misdemeanor manslaughter/assault and battery (-38%), robbery (-36%), and aggravated assault (-14%). Numbers were too small to compare for homicide and rape (Appendix Table 33).

## Property offenses

Property offenses include felony-level burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and misdemeanor-level petty theft/burglary. While the number of adult arrests for a property crime increased from 2018 to 2019 (by 4%), it decreased to a five-year low of 4,331 in 2020 (35% one-year decrease) (Figure 7 and Appendix Table 19). For juveniles, the number of arrests for a property crime dropped consecutively from 827 in 2016 to 305 in 2020. The most recent one-year decrease was 14%, a smaller drop compared to adults (Appendix Table 32).

For adults, all four categories of property crime arrests decreased, ranging from -9% for motor vehicle theft to -55% for petty/theft burglary (Appendix Table 21). For juveniles, while there was an overall decline in property crime arrests, there were some increases within the categories. Specifically, while there were fewer juvenile arrests for petty theft/burglary (-45%) and larceny (-23%) in 2020, compared to 2019, there were more for motor vehicle theft (52%) and burglary (88%) (Appendix Table 34).

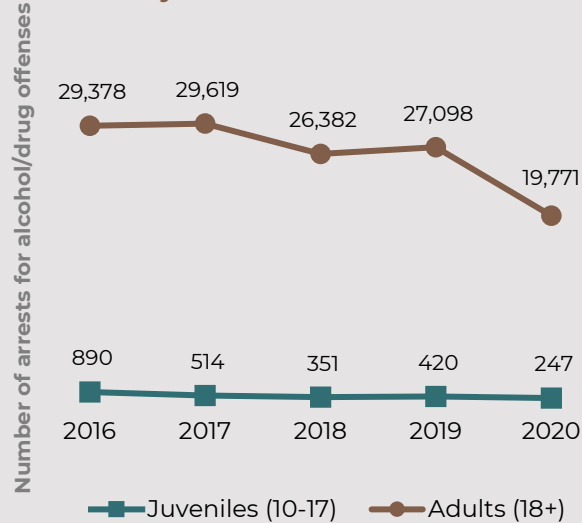


## Alcohol/drug-related offenses

In 2020, there were 19,771 adult and 247 juvenile arrests for alcohol/drug-related offenses (Figure 8). For adults, this represented a 27% decrease from 2019. For juveniles, it was a decrease of 41% (Appendix Tables 19 and 32).

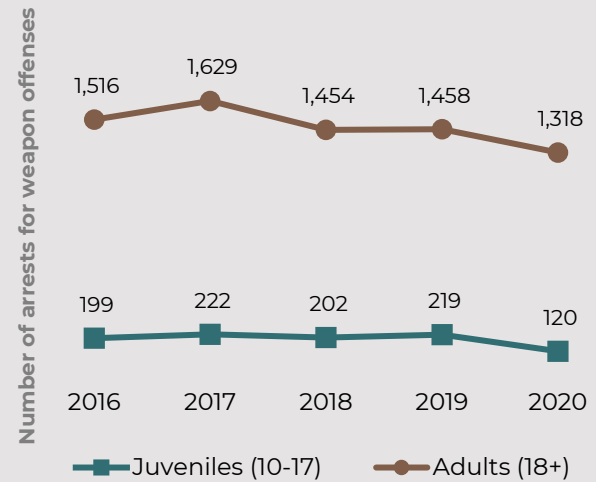
Within the alcohol/drug-related offense category are five felony and five misdemeanor categories. For adults, there were large enough numbers for comparison for eight of the categories, six of which had a one-year decrease (ranging from -17% to -37%) and two of which had a one-year increase (15% for felony narcotics and 38% for felony “other” alcohol/drug offenses) (Appendix Table 22). For juveniles, there were decreases in each of the four misdemeanor-level categories (that had numbers across years large enough to compare), ranging from -26% to -76% (Appendix Table 35).

## Weapons offenses

There were 1,318 adult arrests and 120 juvenile arrests for weapon violations in 2020 (Figure 9), representing a 10% decrease for adults and a 45% decrease for juveniles over the past year (Appendix Tables 19 and 32).

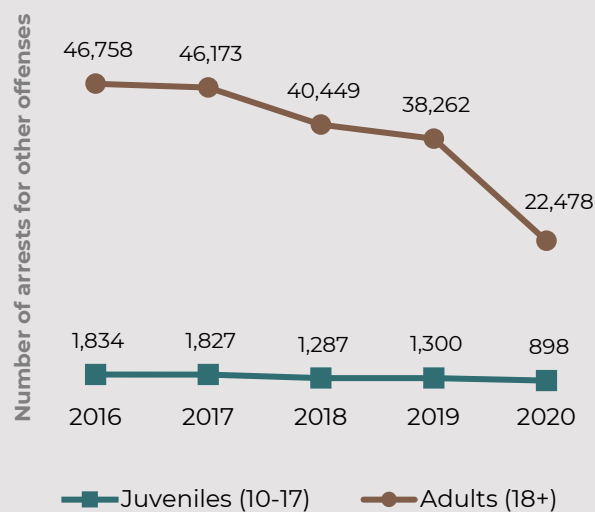
For adults, arrests for felony-level weapon offenses were down 6% and misdemeanors were down 30% (Appendix Table 23). For juveniles, there was a decrease of 35% for felonies and a decrease of 58% for misdemeanors (Appendix Table 36).

## Other offenses

There were 22,478 adult and 898 juvenile arrests for “other” offenses in 2020 (Figure 10). At the felony level, “other” charges include sex-related offenses, forgery, and arson, as well as other felonies (such as kidnapping). At the misdemeanor level, offense types include other theft-related charges, sex-related and prostitution, disturbing the peace, vandalism/graffiti, hit-and-run, selected traffic offenses, violations of city/county ordinances, failure to appear in court offenses, and other charges, such as contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Over the past year, there were decreases in “other” offense arrests for adults (-41%), and juveniles (-31%) (Appendix Tables 19 and 32).

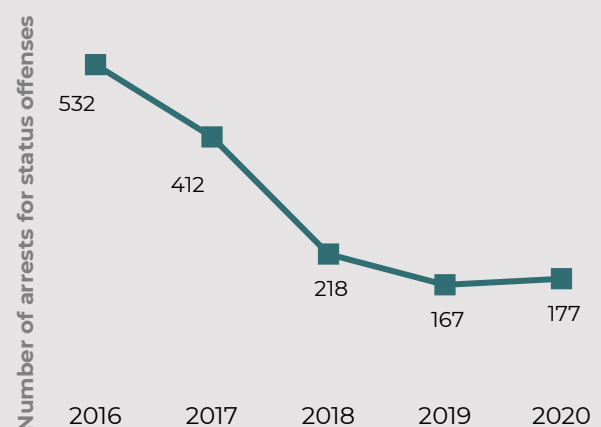
For adults, all “other” crime types at the felony level decreased, except for arrests for arson, which increased 99%. At the misdemeanor level, there were also decreases for all categories except selected traffic offenses (which increased 7%, from 103 in 2019 to 110 in 2020) (Appendix Table 24). For the six categories that had numbers large enough to compare for juveniles, all except one had decreases, ranging from -14% to -37%. The one category with an increase (2%) was disturbing the peace/disorderly conduct (62 arrests in 2020, compared to 61 in 2019) (Appendix Table 37).

## Status offenses

As Figure 11 shows, there were 177 status offense arrests in 2020, which represented a 6% increase from 2019. The only status offense documented in 2020 from the new data extraction process was curfew violations (Table 38).

### Number of status offense arrests up slightly in 2020

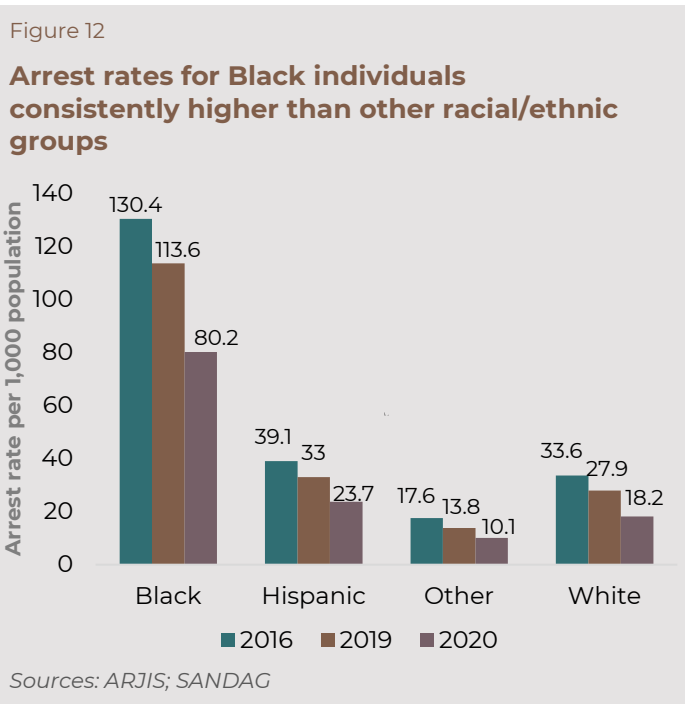

# Arrests Across Race/ Ethnicity and Gender

## Race/Ethnicity

Historically, arrest rates have been calculated for this report by racial/ethnic groups<sup>3</sup> (White, Black, Hispanic, and “other”) overall, as well as separately for adults and juveniles.<sup>4</sup> As noted in previous reports, when one compares these arrest rates, there is disproportionality, with Black individuals<sup>5</sup> having the highest arrest rate and those who identify in “other” groups having the lowest (Figure 12). Over the past five years, arrest rates for each group have decreased, ranging from -38% for Black individuals to -46% for White individuals. When comparing change over the past year, the decreases for the four groups varied from -27% for individuals who identify with “other” racial/ethnic groups to -35% for those who identify as White (Appendix Table 2A).



Delving deeper to look at what types of crimes individuals of different races/ethnicities are arrested for, Figures 13a through 13d show for each of the four groups their proportion of the population, all arrests, and each of the six arrest types. As these figures show:

- Black individuals represented 5% of the population in the San Diego region in 2020 and 16% of all arrests. They were overrepresented in each arrest category, ranging from 13% of all arrests for alcohol/drugs to 22% for weapons.
- Hispanic individuals represented 34% of the population and 35% of all arrests in 2020. They were noticeably overrepresented for weapons and status arrests.
- Individuals in the “other” race/ethnicity category represented 15% of the population and 7% of all arrests. These individuals were also underrepresented in each of the six arrest categories.
- White individuals represent 46% of the population and 41% of all arrests made in 2020. White individuals were also underrepresented for each of the six arrest categories.

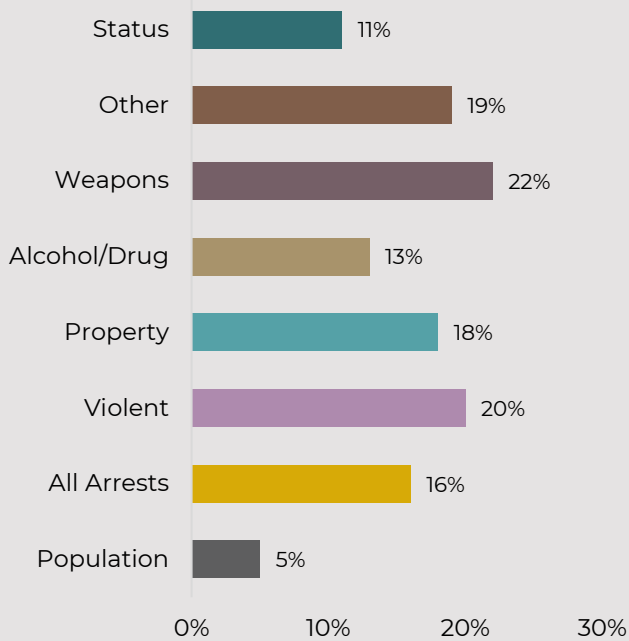
<sup>3</sup> The categories presented here reflect terminology used by the U.S. Census which is the foundation for SANDAG population estimates. The “other” category includes population estimates for individuals who identify as Asian/Pacific Islander, Native American, and mixed/other. Future reports and analyses will include more refined analyses within the current “other” category.

<sup>4</sup> Statistics for adults and juveniles separately are provided in Table 2a.

<sup>5</sup> Race/ethnicity information is compiled from what was documented from law enforcement records and it is possible there is variability in terms of whether an individual self-identified or there was an assumption made by an officer.

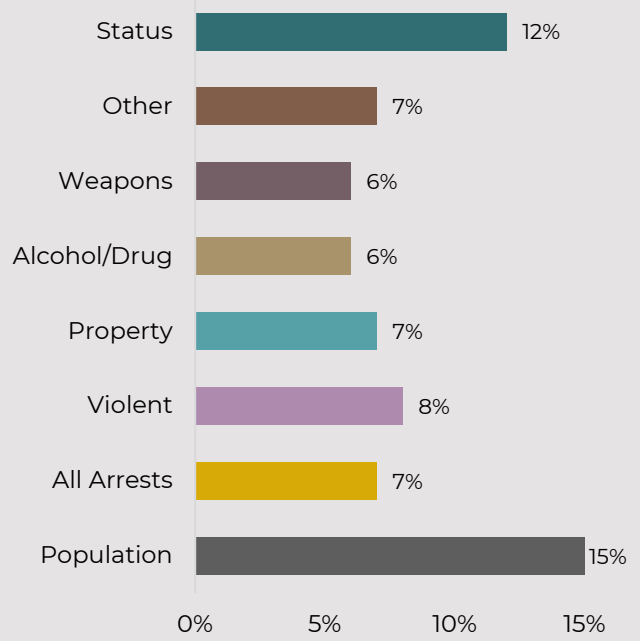
**Black individuals overrepresented in all arrest categories in 2020**

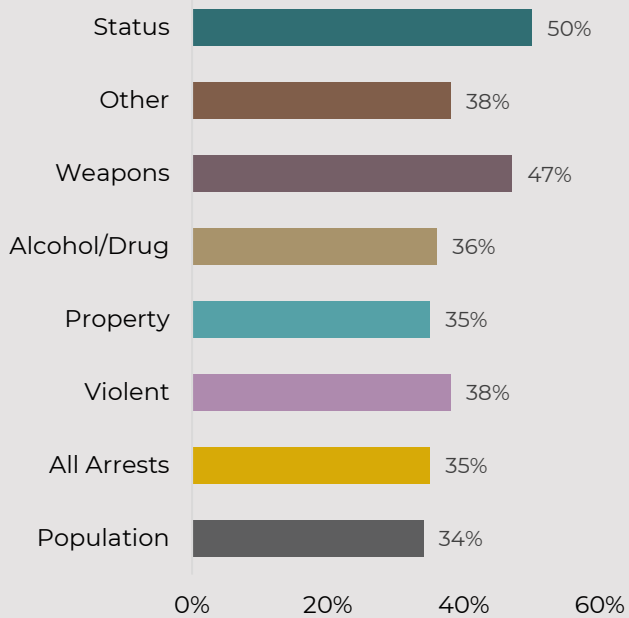
**Individuals of "other" ethnicities underrepresented in all arrest categories**

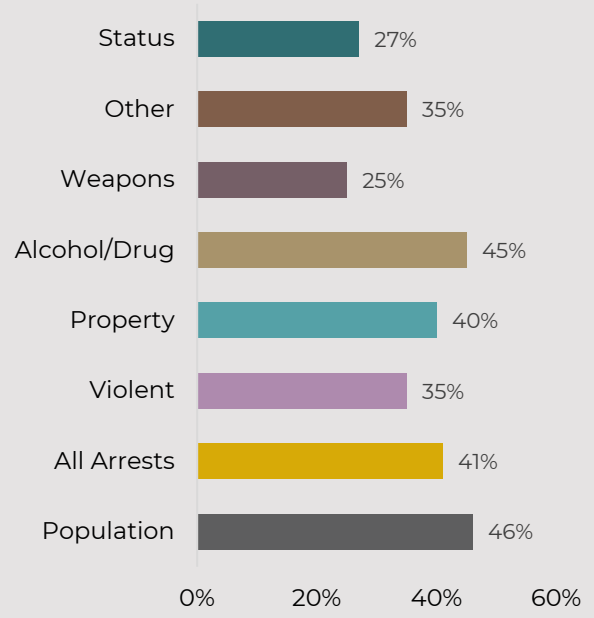
**Hispanic individuals overrepresented in some arrest categories and under in others in 2020**

**White individuals underrepresented in all but one arrest category in 2020**



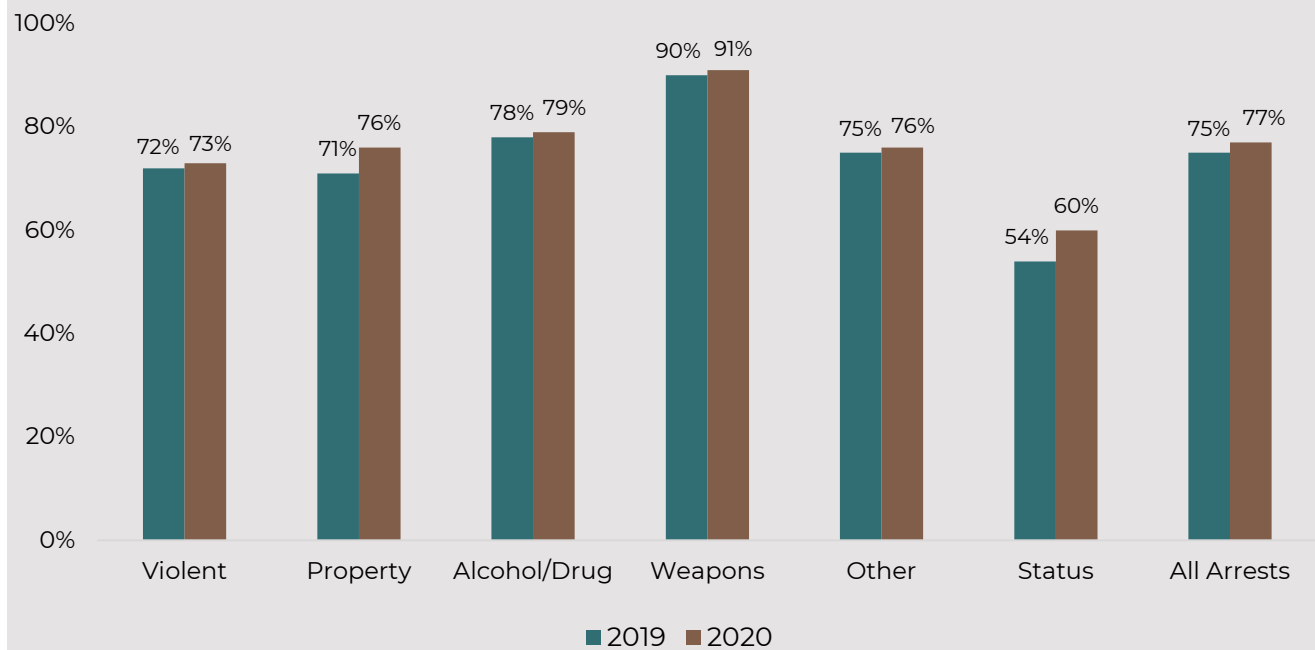

## Gender

As Figure 14 shows, in 2019 and 2020 males represented 75% and 77% of arrests overall. It is also worth noting that for each of the categories, males represented a greater percentage of arrests in 2020, compared to 2019. Across the arrest categories, males represented the greatest proportion of weapon offenses in both years (90% and 91%) and the smallest proportion of status offenses (54% and 60%).

## Additional Notes on the Methodology

As previously noted, the data source for the statistics provided here (ARJIS) is different from the source for previous CJ Bulletins highlighting arrest statistics (DOJ). As such, numbers and rates for 2014 through 2018 which were presented previously have been updated to ensure comparability across the years. However, because of the different data sources, these numbers cannot be compared to past reports. Some changes with previous reports include the possibility of juvenile arrest records in prior years being sealed once a youth reached the age of 18 and the proportion of arrests included in the “other” category being larger than in previous years when the state data were used.

In an attempt to replicate prior methodology, only arrests and citations that were indicated as “Reported to the State Monthly Arrest and Citations Register (MACR)” within the ARJIS database in the MACR status field were included in this report. Arrests/citations with a MACR status of “booked” and “other” were kept in the analysis, while those with a status of “cited” were removed to avoid duplication. Arrests with the highest charge level of infraction or one that could not be determined were also excluded from the analysis.

It should also be noted that the numbers presented here represent a snapshot of arrests at one point in time when data were extracted, while the previous data set from the DOJ was a static reporting source. It is also important to acknowledge that the numbers in this report could vary from those published by other sources because there is the possibility one arrest was counted more than once if an arrest and citation record were created for the same event. Additionally, the ARJIS charge table is not synchronized with the California Master Charge Table and assumptions were required to replicate previously presented categories.

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## Summary

This CJ Bulletin describes what types of arrests were made in the San Diego region in 2019 and 2020 by local law enforcement. Because arrest data were not available from the previous source, local data submitted through ARJIS were analyzed for the past seven years with a revised methodology. Arrest rates were at a seven-year low in 2020, with a 31% decrease in adult and a 30% decrease in juvenile arrests. Declines were seen for all racial/ethnic groups but were smaller for Black individuals who continued to be overrepresented in arrest statistics. At the same time, the proportion of arrests that were felonies and for violent offenses increased. A number of factors, as described in the bulletin could be related to these significant declines, including fewer opportunities for crimes to occur with the stay home order, policy decisions that reduced proactive policing, and reduced contact between potential victims and mandated reporters.
