

JJCPA FUNDS SUPPORT REGIONAL COLLABORATION TO PREVENT JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

Since the late 1990s, juvenile justice stakeholders across the San Diego region have worked collaboratively to identify the needs and service gaps for youth and their families and to make recommendations to the San Diego County Board of Supervisors to invest in proven programs that span from prevention to graduated sanctions. Since 2002, when State funding became available to counties through what is now known as the Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA), San Diego County, in an unprecedented move, brought together key stakeholders and community organizations to collaborate on identifying early prevention and intervention programs and services that are community based and address youth and family needs. To support data-driven decision making and accountability, SANDAG has been tracking program effectiveness in the justice system and other outcomes for JJCPA programs, which includes reporting standardized measures to the State and preparing an annual report. An overview of the six countywide programs, their target populations, and justice system outcomes for the period of participation is provided below.
